

# Principal's Message

As you read this newsletter, students have completed the first term of the 2010 – 2011 school year, and the Winter Break is fast approaching. The fall has been very busy for staff and students with curricular demands and a host of activities in our extracurricular program. The Winter Break will offer a well deserved rest for all.

Students have been issued their Term 1 report cards, which summarize progress toward achieving the learning outcomes for each course on a student's timetable. The percentage assigned as a mark for each course is a measure of a student's achievement in the course. Each teacher also reports on a student's work habits in a course and provides one or two comments intended to offer further insight into the student's mark and/or work habits. Comments often describe what a student is able to do, suggest areas that require attention to ensure student success and offer suggestions for additional support that may be necessary to extend a student's learning. If parents have questions about course grades, work habits or comments, they should contact the teacher of the course, directly.

Magee students have many wonderful opportunities to engage in activities that broaden their educational experience. Highlights from the fall season include:

- \* A day filled with snow as students in our Grade 10 Social Studies classes learned about

the Wind Turbine on Grouse Mountain where they participated in a presentation on wind energy, saw some live wolves and grizzly bears - up close, and participated in a Hiwas First Nations presentation.

- \* Our talented Art students having their work on display at the Vancouver Hycroft Gallery for the month of December.
- \* Our Senior Boys' Soccer Team winning the City Championships and earning a spot in the Provincial Tournament. (Unfortunately, snow in late November cancelled the tournament which has been rescheduled for the spring.)
- \* Students in our junior food classes spending a day in September on three farms in the Fraser Valley. Students visited a hazelnut, cheese and dairy farm to learn about the origin of the products that are part of our diets.
- \* Final preparations for our sustainable garden project that is being undertaken by students in our Environment Club. Students expect our planter box garden supported by organic compost to be underway in spring.
- \* An afternoon of music at our 34<sup>th</sup> annual Seniors' Tea. Seniors from our community as well as alumni and former staff members were treated to a special concert by our String Orchestra, Wind Ensemble, Jazz Band and Chamber Choir. Mr. Dal Richards, a Magee grad, was our honoured guest.

Thank you to the staff for their dedication and commitment and

for making these experiences possible. Also, thank you to our parent community for supporting the school.

## Student Scholarship

I am pleased to report that fourteen students from our 2010 graduating class earned \$1,000 Provincial Scholarships last year. Additionally, seventeen students received \$1,000 District Scholarships for their outstanding achievement in four areas: Fine Arts, Applied Skills, Second Language Studies and Physical Activity. The names of our Provincial and District Scholarship recipients are published in this newsletter. Congratulations to our 2010 recipients for continuing Magee's fine tradition of excellence!

### Extended Vacations

Increasingly, over the last few years, a number of students have been absent from school due to extended family vacations. ## Environment Club



The Magee Environment Club has passed the 10 year milestone and currently consists of 70 members. This group of innovative and diligent students has made an amazing effort to help make Magee a greener place. The club is responsible for the weekly recycling of beverage containers and hard plastics. In liaison with the Magee Leaders Program, Magee's first composting system has been established as well. These environmental stewards also invest time in outdoor

learning. In term I, members had the opportunity to visit the Reifel Bird Sanctuary and Spanish Banks.

This year, the Magee Environment Club is taking on an ambitious project---the building of Magee's first school garden! The garden will be located on the east side of Magee, near the parking lot. Its major purposes are to beautify the school corner and to involve students in the growing of local produce.

The Magee garden will grow organic vegetables, herbs, fruit, evergreen trees, and flowers. We hope it will eventually have its own shed, fencing and greenhouse. The team will set up systems of composting, watering, and irrigation. Portions of the garden beds will be distributed to different teachers and student groups that are willing to plant and look after their own areas.

In October, a Garden Team was formed within the club. This group of passionate students which meets every



second Wednesday, recently visited Windermere Secondary's garden to learn how best to plan the garden. In November, a Garden Designing Contest was held; Magee students and teachers had the chance to vote for their favourite entries. Currently, seven senior students and one of the club's sponsor teachers--Ms Sewerin-- have taken on the leadership positions of this wonderful project. The garden team is currently sourcing materials and tools for the project and we are hopeful that the garden construction will begin mid-January.

## Magee Tourism Hosts 'The Haunted Hallway'
